

GOSPEL REFLECTION



Back again this week to the 'dialogue' between Jesus and the Pharisees. Yet again they try to 'disconcert' him in the hope of getting him to say something which will help get him condemned. Jesus' reply is in fact a summary of the essence of the Christian faith: love God and love your neighbour as yourself. No one can challenge what Jesus says here. He is not denying the Law, which is held to be so important to the Pharisees, but says: "on these two commandments hang the whole Law, and the prophets also." There are people in the Church today whose attitude is similar to that of the Pharisees. They the Church as a set of rules which must be adhered to in order to be saved. But the Church is not a set of rules. The Church founded by Jesus Christ, is based on the law of love. If we follow this, then we will have followed the 'rules' without even realising it.

Promise Of Good Things THE CHRISTIAN LIFE



It is not a particular kind of land or a particular kind of language or even a particular way of life that marks Christians out from their fellow human beings.

They neither have cities of their own nor speak a peculiar kind of dialect, nor do they have a way of life that is noticeably different from the norm. This doctrine of theirs is not one that has been invented by sharp and inquisitive minds, nor are they advocates of man-made dogma, as some people are.

At home in their homelands, they are far from home. They share in all things as citizens, and suffer all things as total strangers. They get married as others do, and have children, but they do not expose their offspring. They will share their table with you, but not their marriage bed. They share the lot of all flesh, but not its fleshliness. On earth

they walk; in heaven they live. They obey the appointed laws and surpass them in their own lives.

They love all people and are hunted down by all. They are unknown, yet publicly condemned. They are put to death, and yet gain life. Though poor, they make others rich. Lacking everything, they have an abundance of every thing. They are dishonoured, to their greater honour, and slandered to their credit.

When abused, they give blessing. When they do good, they are punished as if they did wrong, and being punished, they rejoice as people given new life. They are fought by the Jews as foreigners, and are persecuted by the Greeks - though t those who hate them cannot say why.
