## **GOSPEL REFLECTION**



Today's Gospel sees Jesus carrying healing on a grand scale, starting with Simon's mother-in-law. We are told that the fever left her and she 'began to wait on them'. This may seem like a strange observation and even an unfair one. The poor woman has just recovered from a fever and she immediately sets to work serving the men! But perhaps it also is saying that she had recovered so fully that she was able to do some physical work straightaway without the need to convalesce.

Another interesting thing about this Gospel is that Jesus cast out many devils 'but he would not allow them to speak, because they

knew who he was.' So, it was the devils who knew who Jesus was, not the good people! But why did Jesus not want them to let others know who he was? Jesus was healing people because he has genuine compassion for them, not so that they would follow him. As we see in other parts of the Gospels, Jesus wants people who will follow him by taking up their cross and by becoming 'campfollowers' of a faith healer.

## THE QUALITIES OF THOSE WHO LOVE GOD

The Song of Solomon says that 'Love is as strong as death, jealousy as cruel as the grave' (Song 8: 6). So too, when the love of God takes hold of us, a complete change happens in our way of life. We are not just ready to love God but to bear any hardship or tribulation for God's sake. The mind is set only on the beloved, not passing things.

Those who are wanting to love God must study as best they can (and with the help of God's grace) not be ensnared by boredom or laziness. If we cannot raise our mind to joyful and holy contemplation, nor sing as we once did, we must not on that account give up

reading, praying or other worthwhile things, and just sink into laziness. Boredom leads people into laziness and laziness leads into carelessness and sin. So we must always try to be as fervent as possible in loving God, no matter what we feel like.

Be careful not just to affect a holy exterior in dress and devotion. People can be outwardly pious but inwardly they are lovers of money and an easy prey to temptation. God looks at the heart, and no one can hide their heart from others for ever. Truth will out as they say.
