

GOSPEL REFLECTION



Today we relive the horror of Jesus' prosecution, his carrying the cross and his excruciating death. The danger is that we are so familiar with these events that they can wash over us and we lose the deep meaning of the final hours of Jesus. All of us have experienced failure of one sort or another in our lives. If our failure has led us to desperation, we can have a least an idea of what Jesus went through. The Son of God is born on earth with a mission to save us, to bring back the lost sheep to the Father, and he ends up being beaten and crucified. He has also been abandoned by the men he had chosen to follow him, including the one he had designated as head of his Church. But the moment of his greatest suffering is when he cries out "My God, my God, why have you

deserted me?" He, who always sought to the will of the Father feels abandoned by him. His life seems to have ended in total failure. We will see on Easter Sunday how that apparent failure is transformed into great joy.

INTERNATIONAL POWER

172. The twenty-first century "is witnessing a weakening of the power of nation states, chiefly because the economic and financial sectors, being transnational, tend to prevail over the political. Given this situation, it is essential to devise stronger and more efficiently organized international institutions, with functionaries who are appointed fairly by agreement among national governments, and empowered to impose sanctions". ¹⁴⁹ When we talk about the possibility of some form of world authority regulated by law, ¹⁵⁰ we need not necessarily think of a personal authority. Still, such an authority ought at least to promote more effective world organizations, equipped with the power to provide for the global common good, the elimination of hunger and poverty and the sure defence of fundamental human rights.

Anyone who really loves the name of Jesus might hope to achieve this state. For this I give unending praise and thanks to God. He has given me comfort in sorrow and enables me to await in confidence the everlasting crown.

REFLECTION

As we journey towards Easter, we remember all those in sacramental preparation. The scripture below, used over the last few weeks, is also a reminder to us all about putting ourselves before the Lord and offering ourselves as a servant, as Samuel did.

Then the LORD called, "Samuel! Samuel!" and he said, "Here I am!" and ran to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call; lie down again." So he went and lay down.
