

## What is Private Fostering?

Private Fostering is a term used when a parent or primary carer places a child under the age of 16 (under 18 if disabled), in the care of someone else who is not a close relative\*, or an officially approved foster carer, for a period intended to be 28 days or more.

Since the implementation of the Children Act 2004, it has been a legal responsibility for Local authorities to recognise, monitor and support any child in the area who is being privately fostered.

A Private Fostering notification should come from the parent or carer but professionals can help to identify these arrangements and advise parents/carers of their responsibilities. If you know a child is being privately fostered or you are unsure and need advice, please contact:

## Does someone else's child live with you?

If you are not a \*close relative and look after a child under 16 (under 18 if disabled), for a period intended to be 28 days or more, you may be a Private Foster Carer.

Private Fostering arrangements can include:

- · Teenagers living with the family of their boyfriend/girlfriend
- Children living with someone else whilst their parents are in hospital
- · Children coming from abroad for education and living with another family
- Youngsters living with a friend's family following a separation.

By law you are required to tell the local authority that you are part of a private fostering arrangement. We can advise you on legal matters and provide help and support whilst you care for the child.
